South Australia & Northern Territory Report

I am the National President of South Australia/North Territory for recipients that put their lives on the line to rescue and save the lives or property of other people who are mostly complete strangers. Very often these people are written up in newspapers or on television, pointing out how brave they are. Then very little is ever done to recognise them by the Australian authorities and if they do get recognised with a commendation they are rarely assisted.

The Police, Fire brigade and Ambo's who are fulltime and get paid to do their job are left with a pension for life. Civilians get no help or official recognition other than a medal or a piece of paper to say how much the Government is proud of their achievement in saving a life or a property and then nothing to help them. I want to change this so that anyone who rescues someone will become recognised and then helped if they need it.

During the past year Gillian and I chased up people we had read about or seen on TV - civilians who had rescued people. Because of privacy laws we found it very difficult to contact these people so we could tell them about the ABA. One story was of two men that rescued a drowning woman. Their names were in the paper for a re-union a year later. We eventually met after contacting every person of the surname in the phone book and a relative put us in touch. The gentleman was very angry that nobody had come to their assistance during the rescue. After explaining that I and my daughter had been in a similar situation performing a rescue he was so thankful that he had been able to have a conversation with someone that understood his anxiety and anger. We have had several conversations since and I hope to put these two men in for a commendation.

Gillian and I went to Goolwa where we had read of a group of CFS members who on the 27th July 2012 rescued a lady who had been washed down the flooded Finniss River. Her sinking car was carried in the dark down into a wooded area where she climbed out of the car and clung onto a tree branch for over an hour. From the road no-one could hear her cries for help. The five men and a young sixteen year old were up to their necks in water and unable to get across the river when they located her. The young man said he was a good swimmer and by going upstream he swam across to the other side as he went with the flow. When he reached her he was tying the rope around her when she said she was very scared and his reply was "so am I" and they made it back to the other side by being pulled by the other members. For his efforts he was awarded the Humane Society Bronze Bravery Medal and the Commendation for Brave Conduct and a Certificate of Merit with all the other five members. The CFS captain thanked us from the ABA as he announced that nothing would have been recognized if we had not taken the initiative to meet them and put in a nomination.

I was privileged to represent the ABA at the Anzac Day dawn service at Minlaton, Yorke Peninsula, with friend and our Vice Patron, Darrell Tree CV. Darrell and I also laid wreaths at a ceremony at the Bublacowie Military Museum owned by ABA member Chris Soar later in the morning. This service was attended by about 200 people including the Minlaton Mayor and two councillors, 12 service personnel and seven army cadets from Port Pirie. It was a very solemn occasion with the ashes of a soldier being buried in the Remembrance Garden.

Whilst there we took the opportunity to check out the wonderful exhibitions with rooms, sheds and display cabinets filled with all sorts of memorabilia including photos, diaries, medals, uniforms and a WWII German plane. Chris Soar looks forward to seeing any ABA members who are visiting the area. Check out the Museum on the web.

I am happy to speak to any recipients or family. Best wishes.

Article presented by Dr Geoffrey Boyce

I am reading Kahneman's book "*Thinking Fast, Thinking Slow*" at present. One thing that stands out is that most courageous acts fall into the spectra of **THINKING FAST**. The basic premise is that we do many immediate things quickly, then justify them with our **THINKING SLOW** brain, after the event.

That doesn't mean supreme efforts do not require planning, but as a soldier you know quick action drill when rifle shots come from your left. There is the thinking fast action; then thinking slow strategy.

The brain has two different **AUTOMATIC** systems, sometimes called Flight or Fight. They are the immediate **sympathetic** system (rapid heartbeat), then the **parasympathetic** system (slow heart beat). Clearly bravery acts mainly come from the **Thinking Fast** and being able to fulfil the response. Example, seeing a person in danger of drowning and acting automatically to save them. Situation, its dark wet and raining; sometimes both parties come to grief.

However the successful event **occasionally** are reported and receive due recognition. This brings up another issue; that is recognition. Every day we see news reports of "high flyers" being over recognised, e.g. drunk driving. It's great having a high profile in society, however it carries liabilities. The adage "the bigger you are, the harder you fall". Sometimes that measures both qualitatively and quantitatively, eg Clive Palmer. Keith Payne is the first to admit to the legacy of Bravery Recognition; the "Why Me" Syndrome. Everyone wants to share the glory, but few the intrinsic (change) in self-esteem. If only I had acted quicker could have saved all 4 children, not just two (hypothetical). This is not helped by alcohol and drugs. Good Medical and Psychological counselling is needed. With a GP referral, psychology is well covered by Medicare.

Bravery Recipients are highly regarded in society, and recognised. They should have their own "set of rules", and be able to pass them on to the many more unforeseen recipients who will be duly recognised. The principle advice is again, the old military adage of de-briefing. Secondly proper medical checks, those few scratches should be a good reminder to be up to date with tetanus (still kills 20,000 a year in India). Then a strategy to handle the recognition; the best advice "get on with life". **This needs help, and it is readily available.**



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ABA HONORARY PSYCHOLOGIST REPORT MAY 2014

It is with continued gratitude and an honour to accept the request to continue in my role as Honorary Psychologist to the ABA for 2014. I believe that the NX of the ABA have succeeded in steering the Association back on track and this was experienced firsthand by those attending the annual event in Canberra this year. Once again the fellowship and camaraderie helped those individuals needing support to find understanding enabling them to focus on what really counts for them.

The gatherings, both formal and informal, facilitate this understanding and support. Whether you are fragile as a result of your act of bravery or doing very well, the times together mean so much to those who attend.

I have spoken before about how important I think these events are for members in all sorts of ways and hope that as we move forward more people will decide to come along and enjoy themselves or to find support with other members who make up the ABA.

Of course not every one of us who has been awarded for their act of bravery suffers as a result of this. However for those of us who do and you recognize any of the following symptoms of unease ranging from difficulty sleeping, easily upset or alarmed, startling easily, anxious feelings beyond worry, excessive use of substances, changed diet, thoughts of self-harm, irritability, poor concentration, inability to stay focused and complete things, feelings of physical restlessness, the mind not turning off and racing thoughts; these are all very unpleasant feelings and if some or all of these are experienced by you it is really important that you seek help beyond your partner, family or friends. These people are really important but they do not have all the answers to help and will wear out.

You can start by speaking to your GP who in most cases will take an interest in these sorts of issues, but you DO need to describe what is happening to you in detail. If you are unable to get a referral to a psychologist or specialist who deals more specifically with severe symptoms, then try another GP until you are taken seriously. The referral enables you to claim back part of, or the whole fee of a psychologist through Medicare. A psychologist has training to deal with these symptoms and more.
